Mission

Boys State provides a relevant, interactive, problem-solving experience in leadership and teamwork that develops self-identity, promotes mutual respect, and instills civic responsibility.

History

Experience is often the best teacher. The essence of Boys State is a program in which participants learn about leadership by becoming a mock government. This technique, which we refer to as learning-by-doing, was the goal Legionnaires Hayes Kennedy and Harrold L. Card wanted to reach when they founded Boys State in Illinois in 1935. Kansas was the fifth state in the country to adopt this program.

Since 1937 Kansas Boys State has brought together young men from all over the state. Our mission is to provide a relevant, interactive, problem-solving experience in leadership and teamwork that develops self-identity, promotes mutual respect, and instills civic responsibility. The Kansas program is unique in how it uses an interactive computer simulation to facilitate our mission. This simulation allows delegates to choose which issues they want to address. The action of changing taxes, hiring police and educators, and passing bills in the legislature have a direct impact on everyone in the simulation.

Delegates are provided feedback about projects completed at the city, county, and state-level about their performance. Also, within the program, we have the Media and Highway Patrol. The Media reports on everything happening at state and hosts the state officer debate. The Highway Patrol works within the simulation to assist in enforcing laws that are created by the legislature.

In the history of the program, only two sessions have been canceled first for World War II in 1945 and 2020 due to COVID. Boys State Alumni have become City Mayors, State Senators, College Student Body Presidents, and most importantly leaders in their community.

Message from the Governor



Sunday
